Historic Nauvoo will host a free Christmas Walk on Friday, December 10, beginning at 6:00 pm. A variety of activities and performances will be available simultaneously until about 9:00 p.m. Wagons will take guests between the Family Living Center and the Old Nauvoo Main Street, where old-fashioned storytelling will be offered in three locations. Visitors can also take in musical performances in the Cultural Hall. Parking is available north of the Family Living Center but not near the storytelling sites. The Visitors Center will host some local performing groups: the Warsaw High Jazz Band at 6:00 p.m.; the Warsaw Choral group will follow at 7:00. A nativity will be staged twice in the west theater beginning at 6:30 pm, and a Christmas film will repeat in the east theater. Refreshments will be available in the Family Living Center. Nauvoo City Council November 9, 2021

The Council approved the following:

- Increased the hourly pay to the City's part-time employees from \$12.69 to \$16.00, effective immediately. This was done to keep Nauvoo's pay rate in line with that of other communities.
- Increased the hourly pay of City Treasurer Ana LeVesque from \$16.33 to \$17.50, also effective immediately.
- The hiring of Derek Himan as a part-time police officer. Himan is currently Chief of Police at Carthage.
- The purchase of two furnaces for the old school gymnasium. These two 200,000BTU furnaces will be installed by Peters Heating & Air at a cost of \$5,722.
- Replacing lights at City Hall with LED lights. This will be done by Tom Hopp at a cost of \$1,363.
- Increase water & sewer rates by 3% effective January 1, 2022. This is the same rate of annual increase as has been the past five years.
- Purchase of concrete (up to \$2,000) for improvement of sidewalk on the west side of N Page Street in front of the Nauvoo Food Pantry.
- Approved a Variance Request to allow nightly rentals at 2105 Parley Street. The variance was requested by Jason and Sarah McDonald. The property is surrounded on both sides by nightly rentals. The aldermen disagreed among themselves, some stating that approving the request would undercut existing lodging businesses, while others countered that during the busy pageant season, Nauvoo lodgings are fully booked and that visitors stay and spend their money in Fort Madison and Keokuk. Newly elected Chamber of Commerce president Tom Grant spoke in favor of approval, opining that Nauvoo would miss out on revenue if they didn't. He also asked if there was a way to allow residents to rent property during the heavy tourist season. Aldermen Adkisson, Christensen and Nicholl voted in favor. Anozie, Boyles and Grant voted no. The motion carried with Mayor Skog's tie-breaking vote.

Other:

- Mayor Skog reported that the 2020 Census reports Nauvoo population to be 950. This is down from the 1,149 reported in the 2010 count. Skog was concerned that Nauvoo was undercounted because the missionaries were sent home because of COVID (and have since returned), and that this would reduce population-based funding to the City. He said he left a message with the Census office in Chicago to inquire about getting a recount. He has not heard back.
- The mayor also announced the receipt of a PILOT (Payment in Lieu of Taxes) from The Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints) payment of \$54,000, and that this was the third of five annual payments that will decrease approximately 20% each year until phased out in 2023.
- He acknowledged the presence of several Scouts B.S.A. members. These young men are earning their Citizenship in the Community merit badge.

City Council Continued

- The City Council then revisited the matter of accepting an offer from Mark Anderson of the Nauvoo Park District. The Park District last month proposed an agreement with the City to maintain the city-owned City Park, relieving the City of the financial burden of maintaining and improving the City Park. City Attorney Diane Vine repeated her advice via text message that the Park District has no legal authority to contract with the City regarding city-owned property. Again, Mark Anderson disagreed, citing the opinion of another attorney. Some aldermen expressed concerns received from constituents about work needed at the Nauvoo Park District itself. (The Nauvoo City Park is located at the corner of Bluff and Knight Streets. It is maintained and operated by the City.
- The Nauvoo Park District is located at the corner of Winchester and Young Streets. It is a five-acre park with ball diamonds and playground equipment. It is maintained and operated by the Nauvoo Park District.)
- Some aldermen stated their reluctance to go against the counsel of the City Attorney. One resident asked what the logic was of not allowing the Park District to do this. Finally, Mark Anderson withdrew the offer, stating that in the opinion of members of the Park District Board, the City was losing a golden opportunity.
- Randy Soland, speaking by telephone, pitched his proposal for an Oktoberfest to be held in Nauvoo at the old school grounds. He offered to pay the expenses for the first year. One alderman asked if there would be a problem because the groundbreaking for the new community center would have already taken place and there would be construction fences up. They decided that the event could take place on the southeast corner of the property, where the playground used to be. The event will be on Saturday, October 22, 2022, one week before the Nauvoo Pumpkin Walk.
- Mayor Skog said that he would not be at next month's City Council meeting (in order to attend his son's wedding in St. Louis) and appointed Alderman Larry Nicholl as temporary chairman for the December 14 meeting.

Former Nauvoo Resident Passes Away

William C. "Bill" Scully, 89, died October 23, in Chesterfield, Missouri. Bill succeeded founder Oscar Rohde as president of Nauvoo Blue Cheese Company (1965 to 1987), continuing as president until the company was sold to Raskas Foods. The company was well known for producing a premium domestic cheese, earning the prestigious Best Blue Cheese in the U.S and the World's Best Blue Cheese in 1984. His wife Marie survives. Eighth Annual Messiah Concert



Documentary Film, the Tomb of Joseph

The *Tomb of Joseph* documentary film premier was hosted by producer Brian Christiansen at the Nauvoo Family Inn & Suites. Filming took place in June 2021. Many locals were used as extras.

The film reviews the Latter-day Saints' arrival in Nauvoo and their building of the city. Scenes set in modern times tell the story of Brian Christiansen, owner of Zion's Mercantile, unearthing an underground structure in front of the store that conjures up the story of Joseph Smith's earnest desire that a tomb be constructed near the Temple as a final resting place for himself and his family, although the exact location of the storied tomb has been lost over the years. (His remains rest at the Smith Family Cemetery at the Joseph Smith Historic Site),

Many possible locations have been brought up regarding where such a tomb might have been located—many have been dismissed as wine cellars built at a later date. According to Christiansen, the *Tomb of Joseph* film has been accepted into the LDS Film Festival in March 2022. The film being distributed soon thereafter. The Tomb of Joseph Museum, erected on the spot, is anticipating a grand opening in early spring.

Hedge Apples

No, these apples aren't for pie. However, you might want to use them to control spiders! Most people are familiar with baseball-sized "hedge balls," the green, wrinkly fruit of the Osage orange



tree. These can be found dotting the landscape in the area. While there is no scientific proof to support the claim, many homeowners use the apples to repel spiders and other pests. Here's the "recipe." Select the fruit that is still green (not brown and overripe). Leave the stem intact, which prevents the fruit from oozing a milky substance. While the juice is not toxic, it may irritate sensitive skin. Put each hedge apple into a small bowl, or some other container to contain any leakage that could stain flooring, etc. The best place to place them is in closets, under the sink, or around the perimeter of your home. Discard once they have turned brown, within a month or two. It might be worth a try.

Agrivoltaics

Agriculture has always adapted to meet the needs of a changing society: from tractors and pest management to breeding and genomics. Today, there're risks brought on by a changing climate. Enter agrivoltaics. ("agri" relating to food production; "voltaic" relating to electricity production). This new technology promises to improve food production and reduce water use, while also creating energy and additional revenue. Solar panels placed on the same land where crops are grown allow growers to harvest the power of the sun twice. The solar panels also help plants grow more efficiently by needing less water (plants have a limit to how much sun they can actually use. Once reached, any light beyond hat point does not increase photosynthesis or help the plant grow; it only increases the plant's water demand.) The panels can be positioned to allow plant just the right amount of sunlight, and then the excess sunlight can be harvested for electricity, making the panels producing electricity even more than they would without crops below them because the plants help keep the solar panels cool. This electricity, then, can be used to run the farm. Surplus energy can be stored in battery banks or sent to the grid for consumer use. Agrivoltaics is a symbiotic relationship providing a win-win-win for the future of farming.
