Groundbreaking Announced

The Nauvoo Community Center will have an "official" groundbreaking ceremony on Friday, May 20, 6:00 pm. (The ground was actually "broken" in April.

Now that construction of the Nauvoo Community Center construction is happening, the Nauvoo Community Center Capital Campaign Committee (NC5) is hoping that you will want to make a first or an additional gift to the capital campaign. Donations will focus on upgrades to materials, parking provisions, sidewalks, and landscaping.

Nauvoo Park District Seeks New Board of Commissioners

After many years of service to the Nauvoo Park District and its Park, the 5 member board has collectively decided it is time to get some fresh spirits involved in its management. The board is seeking 5 individuals as replacements; hoping that candidates who have children and friends that utilize the park will be interested in its oversight and improvements.

Park District Commissioners are non-partisan and must have lived within the Park District (City of Nauvoo or Nauvoo Township) for at least one year. Candidates must also be registered voters within the park district. If appointed to fill a vacancy, the new commissioners shall have to file a statement of economic interest. Meetings are typically once per month, excluding December.

Nauvoo City Council Minutes April 12, 2022

Agenda Business Items:

- Approved the payment of per diem to Chief of Police Mike Boley for a training trip to Minnesota.
- Approved a five-year contract to Kohlmorgan Hauling (lone bidder) for trash and recycling for Nauvoo's [non-commercial residents] at a cost of\$16 a month per household. Kohlmorgan recycles cardboard, paper, steel and aluminum cans, and plastic (no glass). The curbside recycling will replace the dumpster on the old school grounds. Currently residents pay \$10 a month for trash removal.
- Awarded mowing bid for City properties to Dustin LeBonte of Carthage, who will receive \$650 per mowing. Three bids were received.

Other:

- Learned that Alderman Nicholl is pursuing a Scenic Byways Grant for upgrading downtown public restrooms.
- Announced the citywide cleanup on April 27th
- Announced a Taco Supper at the new Knights of Columbus Hall (former furniture store) on Saturday, May 7. Proceeds go towards the joint fireworks display with Montrose.
- Approved a request to allow bus traffic on Young Street east of Main this summer bus access to the Sarah Grange Kimball barn for youth activities.
- Considered a change to the City Code to require itinerant merchants (such as food trucks) to pay a larger fee to the City. The amount of the fee would be time based and business activity. Expressed concerns included additional taxation for present merchants as well as the fact that itinerant merchants do not pay sales tax to the City, which led to possibility of a required itinerant merchants' sales that would include the Nauvoo City sales tax and seeing that the tax be collected. The aldermen voted to table this proposal until next month
- Authorized the purchase of ten "Smart" thermostats (c. \$500) for the old school for c. 25% cost reduction.
- Discussed pros and cons of participation in IMRF (Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund), providing City employees working more than 1,000 hours per year with a better retirement plan. Participation in the IMRF is irrevocable; once adopted, there is no change of course. Chief Boley gave a detailed explanation of the benefits and costs of the program. Costs to the City would increase from about \$16K to \$44K per year. (Ex. a \$100,000 home would pay \$31-\$50 a year more, depending on method of City's funding. Hamilton, Dallas City, Warsaw, and Carthage; as well as the Nauvoo-Colusa School District are members of IMRF. Members of audience voiced their opinions for the proposal with pro comments supporting City workers' upgrade in their retirement plans, giving incentive for them to remain their jobs long term, avoiding the City's need for recruiting, hiring, and training new workers, which is expensive. Several former aldermen in the audience expressed regret that the City declined to join IMRF in the past. Con comments included not wanting to pay more taxes and the fact that the self-employed must provide their own retirement. The City Council approved the second reading of this ordinance, 5-1. Aldermen Anozie, Adkinson, Christensen, Boyles, and Nicholl in favor; Grant, opposed. The decision will be made after the third reading at the May meeting.
- Jim Cobb, representing Nauvoo Adventure Rentals, assured the Council and those gathered that the 6 golf carts and 30 Go-Karts rented out to visitors would not be intolerably noisy. These vehicles would not be allowed on Mulholland Street. They are outfitted with lights, turn signals, and all required safety features. Police Chief Boley affirmed that the police would have a "zerotolerance" policy on the vehicles.

City Council Minutes Continued

• The City Council considered what to do about a recent requirement by the Nauvoo Fire Protection District (NFPD) for fire suppression sprinkler systems, specifically in the new Community Center building. This is an unexpected cost (estimated at \$125,000) that the City did not anticipate, as it was not required in the building code. Chief Kendall Gallaher of the Nauvoo Fire Protection District spoke passionately in favor of the requirement to install sprinkler systems in the new Community Center, emphasizing that it saves lives of the public and of firefighters.

NOTE: At the March meeting of the City Council, the City awarded the contract for construction of the new community center after a year of soliciting bid proposals. The proposals were following what the City Engineer set as the current code guidelines which showed that sprinklers were not required as long as all other fire safety guidelines were met. The new sprinkler ordinance was adopted by the Nauvoo Fire Protection District a week after the March City Council meeting. There is disagreement about whether the NFPD adequately informed City and Nauvoo Community Center Capital Campaign Committee (NC5) about the sprinkler requirement.

There was lengthy discussion about the need for better communication between the City and the Nauvoo Fire Protection District in the future on issues of this magnitude. The City Council voted unanimously to follow the new (sprinkler) ordinance and cover the cost of this addition.

New Garbage Contract

Tired of their not being enough room for your recyclables in the recycling trailer located at the old school? Well, you'll be happy to learn that, as of June of this year, recycling is coming to your house. Only one bid for residential garbage hauling was received and opened at the April City Council meeting. Kohlmorgan prepared two bids: garbage pickup only (\$7,000 per month); with recycling added (\$8,000). (The City's last year paid Kohlmorgan \$5,290 per month w/o recycling plus additional costs of \$6,000 per year for recycling trailer rental and \$490 a month for two city workers to haul trailer to and from Fort Madison for dumping.) City residents will find a \$16 charge on their water bills (from \$10). Residents will supply their own recycling tub or container marked "recyclables." Garbage and recyclables will be picked up separately. No more hauling things in your truck or trunk. No more eyesore of an overly filled bin in our uptown area. Thanks to Janet Hill for putting the home recycling opportunity in the City's ear at the Council's March meeting. They were listening.

Fire District News

Paul McKoon, who has served over 30 years on the Fire District's Board of Trustees, will be retiring at the end of next month. Elgin Berry will take his place effective June 1. Also, starting in May 2022, board meeting will now be held on the third Thursday of each month at 6:30 p.m. Brian Scheetz and Julie Stout recently passed EMT training tests and are waiting for their state license to arrive. Seven more EMT students are scheduled to take their exams. The EMT course and two new heart monitors were funded by a \$115,000 Federal Grant aimed at Rural EMS agencies. Chief Gallaher also reported that the annual pancake breakfast and Easter Egg Hunt was well attended by 266 individuals and netted a profit of \$1,259 which will be used for the purchase of small equipment. Other items discussed included the installation of a new cellphone signal booster in one ambulance and the replacement of a door lock on the building.


