# Sneak Preview and Fundraiser for Nauvoo Community Center Planned for September

Everyone is watching the construction progress of the Nauvoo Community Center. Lately, however, From the outside, not much has changed due to delay in the shipment of the windows. Once they are in place, the siding (already painted offsite), rock facing, and trim will be installed. Meanwhile, the wiring has been run, internet service needs have been met, and preparation for drywalling is being made. Now everyone is curious about how the inside is going to look, and the Nauvoo Community Center Capital Campaign Committee (NC5) have made plans for a public "sneak preview" and fundraising open house.

Mark your calendar for Friday, September 16, from 4:00-6:00 p.m. As attendees gather, they will be grouped into small-group tours led by NC5 members, who will do a walk-through with them, explain layouts, and answer questions. A floor plan of the library and a site plan for the outside of the building will be available for a better understanding how the finished spaces, inside and out, will look. (As of now, completion date is slated for the end of October with move-in date still TBD.)

For the past three years NC5 has been fundraising for the construction. With the help of many, both local and away, that financial goal was met without using any city monies. Anyone who has ever participated in a construction project knows that needs grow and costs escalate rather quickly. FFE (fixtures, furniture, and equipment) were items not included in the construction price. (FYI: Part of the Library Grant, or \$90,000, was designated to go toward library FFE only.) Therefore, NC5 agreed that any money raised up-and-above cost of construction would be applied toward the FFE in the building's interior and exterior spaces.

In order to help defray some of these expenses, the Committee created a list of these additional costs for those who would like to underwrite (sponsor) one, or more FFE items: stove, microwave, sink, drop boxes, shelving, cabinets, trees, plantings, etc. Lists with costs will be available at the sneak preview for those who are interested in underwriting/sponsoring one or more of these. NC5 mascot Oscar, the Pig, (complete with a QR code on his belly) and forms to purchase a commemorative brick or paver will also be available that afternoon.

Note: Schickedanz Construction has indicated that people are entering the building during working hours without prior invitation from their staff. For both safety and insurance reasons, no one—including City workers, NC5 members, etc.--is to be in the building without permission. We appreciate your understanding in this matter.

## The Game's the Thing!

This year the Nauvoo Betterment Association (NBA) made good on their promise to put more fun opportunities for tourists uptown. Last month's See Nauvoo News highlighted a piano that had been painted and placed in front of Grandpa John's. (It's been rumored that a scarecrow diva just might be seen draped across the top of the piano....). In July, Four in a Row, a game similar to Tic Tac Toe, appeared on the site of *The Way We Were* Walking Tour. (Pictured is the gloating sister who had just beaten her brother.) A Corn Hole game (bean bag toss) is now located in the area between Annie's Custard and Eborn

Books. Coming soon is a giant chess set, location still to be determined. "Check" it out, "mate"!

# **NBA Proposed Projects**

Other than the aforementioned games, an NBA committee is also working on interactive things related to nature. NBA member Jordan Bodily, Nauvoo Facilities Management (FM, formerly NRI) director added to the possibility when he mentioned that FM had already identified 4,000+ trees in the Historical District. Methods of identifying them, as well as other interesting species outside the Historic District, is being taken on by committee members Annette McLane, Rita Souther, and Karen Ihrig. (If you know of an especially interesting arboreal specimen in your neighborhood, let one of the committee members know.) This nature project will coincide with Nauvoo Riverwalk, whose signage merely highlights the more obvious birds and aquatic types. The Riverwalk hopes to include additional pictures and information of area flora and fauna. People who come to Nauvoo will be able to enjoy learning about more than the history of the area. NBA would like to provide the opportunity to do so. It is hoped that the tree ID will be the start of more moments to explore and learn what nature has to offer right here in Nauvoo.

#### Nauvoo City Council July 12, 2022

The City Council voted to do the following:

- Write a letter of endorsement to the Illinois Department of Transportation for a crosswalk at Bluff and Mulholland Street (between the State Bank of Nauvoo and Zion's Mercantile store).
- Establish an ordinance to appropriate for and to levy a separate tax for the City's employer contributions to the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF). The City will be required to make monthly contributions to IMRF in order to fund benefits for participants. This sets up a separate fund for the IMRF, but will not raise taxes this year.
- Adopt new rules for public participation at open meetings. These
  rules include reducing time for each speaker from five to two
  minutes, expecting proper decorum from speakers, and the ability
  to rule violators to be "out of order", and even removed, if
  necessary.

#### Other:

Be aware of scams! Police Chief Mike Boley alerted the public of scams that attempt to trick people out of their money. An elderly gentleman was at Casey's attempting to purchase hundreds of dollars' worth of Apple gift cards, believing doing so would pay to get a virus removed from his computer. Chief Boley tried to get him to stop, but the fellow was adamant. Boley finally was able to go with the gentleman to his car and call the person who had been calling him. Once Chief Boley got on the phone, the scammer hung up.

Another related incident occurred when a citizen came to the office in a panic, saying their computer had been taken over. A scammer gave her instructions to wire money from her bank, along with instructions as to what to say and what NOT to say to the bank employee. The victim was adamant that this was legitimate. Chief Boley got her to let him talk to the scammer, who soon hung up. Another Nauvoo resident purchased something online and was making monthly payments to someone in Nebraska but never did receive the product. Boley advised that when making an online purchase, to use either PayPal or a credit card that provides fraud protection.

The Council then went into executive session to discuss a personnel matter.

# **Buses Abound in Nauvoo This Year**

Scheduled tour buses in Nauvoo as of April this year were/ are as follows: May (15), June (116), July (115), August (22), September (14), and October (7). Well the shear number of tourists and busses can sometimes seem overwhelming to our town of 950, we are happy to have them.

It is timely that Nauvoo is part of the library evolution. It's not only going to be bigger-- 2400 sq. ft. rather than its original 640 sq. ft.-- but it's going to be even better! #### **NFPD Board of Trustees Meeting**

The Nauvoo Fire Protection District (NFPD) Board of Trustees' July meeting involved adopting a tentative, published budget. A public hearing is scheduled for 6:00 p.m. on Friday, August 26 at the fire station. In other business the Trustees took the following actions: Approved spending \$4,506 for a 3-year maintenance contract for a CPR machine and paying \$7,443 to Floorcrafters of Fort Madison, Iowa, for new tile and carpeting at the fire station. A budget category was created for towards future ambulance replacement; \$25,000 was set aside toward this goal.

Chief Kendall Gallaher reported that in 2022 the NFPD had answered 180 calls as of June 30. In June there were 24 EMS (ambulance) runs and 6 fire runs. Gallaher also reported on repairing the air conditioner in the ambulance as well as applying for grants for new boots for the firefighters (\$4,000) and Self - Contained Breathing Apparatus for the firefighters.

#### An "Old" New Face at Nauvoo-Colusa



#### **Service of Remembrance**



It was held at the Smith Family Cemetery, where Joseph, Hyrum, and Emma Smith are buried. Members of both Community of Christ and The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints came together to remember these historical figures whom they look to as founders of their faith communities.
