The Element of Surprise

What an eventful time we have had these last few weeks. Naturally it all happens right in the middle of the busiest time of the year for our little town. The Derecho left everyone exhausted, stressed, cautious and on high alert. Nothing like being out of electricity for days on end to put nerves on edge. Clean-up was tedious, exhausting, and intense. But we all got through it. Then after a few days to catch our breath, some of us had to deal with a water main break. I am sure that many people in the city (visitors and residents alike) saw the guys working frantically to keep the situation as contained as they possibly could.

Our water main break came from an unusually high volume of water pressure suddenly pushed into the system at one time, which caused a hole to blow through the pipe. In such a situation the damaged piece of pipe needs to be removed and a new section replaced. To do this, sometimes, the guys need to temporarily shut off sections of water that flow through that area of pipe. But before we even get to that step they have to get the backhoe and dig in the approximate area of the break then they have to physically get into the hole and finish digging through mud and clay manually so they don't damage anything more than it is. All this being done while pumping out as much water as possible. By no means does it get all the water out before they get into that hole. Needless to say this all takes time and the last thing we want to do at this time of year is turn the water off unless we have exhausted all other efforts.

Because in this instance, they had to shut the water off to make the repair, the EPA requires a BOIL ORDER as a PRECAUTIONARY measure. After our samples were driven directly to the testing laboratory in Peoria, Illinois and all appropriate tests were run, our samples came back CLEAN. This means that at no time did any contamination get into the waterlines. Due to the timing of the break being so close to the derecho, City Hall was able to provide residents that came by with bottles of water. Thank you's go out to the Hancock County Sheriff's Office and Pepsi for providing cases of water, during the derecho and subsequent clean up, that were needed even more during the break.

While there is no perfect way to alert several hundred people and numerous visitors, the most efficient ways were chosen. Hancock County Health was notified, a post was made on Facebook, and the news media outlets were notified. Thankfully it was short lived.

The Nauvoo Fire Protection District Board of Trustees July 20, 2023

The main topic of discussion was the FY23-24 budget (June 1, 2023 through May 31, 2024). A public meeting on the budget will be held at the fire station on Thursday, August 24 at 6:30pm.

There has been an increase in brush fires within the district both before and after the storm. Sometimes people burn their storm debris and the flames get out of control.

Chief Gallaher also spoke about NFPD efforts to improve their ISO score. He is optimistic that their ISO score will improve because of the many new initiatives that NFPD has implemented since their last inspection. Some of those initiatives include enforcing an updated fire code and sprinkler ordinances.

An organization called ISO (Insurance Services Office) creates ratings for fire departments and their surrounding communities. These ratings calculate how well-equipped fire departments are to put out fires in that community. ISO provides this score, often called the "ISO fire score," to homeowners insurance companies. Insurers then use it to help set homeowners insurance rates. The better equipped your fire department is to put out a fire, the less likely your house is to burn down. That makes your home less risky, and therefore less expensive, to insure.

An ISO fire rating, also referred to as a fire score is a score from one to 10 that indicates how well-protected your community is by the fire department. In the ISO rating scale, a lower number is better: one is the best possible rating, while a 10 means the fire department did not meet ISO's minimum requirements.

According to ISO's Fire Suppression Rating Schedule (FSRS), four main criteria comprise a fire rating score:

- 50% comes from the quality of your local fire department, including staffing levels, training and proximity of the firehouse.
- 40% comes from availability of water supply, including the prevalence of fire hydrants and how much water is available to put out fires.
- 10% comes from the quality of the area's emergency communications systems (911).

8-2-3: DOGS AT LARGE:

- A. Any dog running at large, at any time, within the limits of the city, and not bearing a tag or other identifying device, is hereby declared a nuisance, and shall be impounded by a representative authorized by the city council to so act at the Hancock County pound in Carthage, Hancock County, Illinois; and, as such dog running at large shall be within the jurisdiction of said county pound in Carthage and shall be disposed of accordingly.
- B. Any dog running at large, at any time, within the limits of the city, bearing a tag issued by the city clerk, is hereby declared a nuisance and shall be restrained and impounded by a representative authorized by the city council to so act. The city shall give notice to the registered owner or keeper that said dog has been impounded by a representative authorized by the council to so act, and after said dog's impoundment at the county pound in Carthage, Hancock County, Illinois, for a period of time to be determined by the county, said dog shall be within the jurisdiction of said Hancock County pound and disposed of accordingly.
- C. It shall be unlawful to permit any dog to be on any public street, sidewalk, alley or other public place unless such dog has a collar firmly attached around his neck with a license tag for the current year attached to such collar, as well as a leash attached to said collar of sufficient size and strength to control and maintain said dog while on the public street, sidewalk, alley or other public place. (Ord. 1997-3, 10-14-1997)

8-2-7: SOLID WASTE REMOVAL:

Any person who shall walk a dog on public or private property shall provide for the proper disposal of the solid waste deposited by the dog by means of immediate removal of the waste into a container device which is capable of receiving and containing waste material therein. (Ord. 1997-3, 10-14-1997)

French Heritage Days



Total attendance for the three-day event was 151.



Horsing Around in Nauvoo



Everyone is aware of the horse -drawn wagons that carry visitors through the Historic District on the flats. One can't miss the clop clop, mane tossing, and occasional snorts of the majestic animals that pull them. According to Elders Julander and Mower, two of the "teamsters" (old

word for those who drove the wagons and guarded the freight), there are twenty-six draft horses (thirteen teams).

The teams are made up of either Belgians or Percherons, most of which are already partially trained when they purchased at four or five years old from the Amish horse sales near Kalona, Iowa. (There are no Clydesdales, aka "Budweiser" horses, which are showier with their feathery hair on their fetlocks, or ankles.) One can recognize an Amish-raised horse, as their tails are docked to keep them from getting caught in the machinery. The present herd has only two "long tails."

All the tan horses are Belgians. All the black horses are Percherons. Interestingly, the "odd horse out" is a dappled gray Percheron named Matt who, according to the teamsters, is the herd leader, the one who traditionally attains dominance through biting and kicking his way to the top. Go figure! These magnificent beasts are usually kept until they are thirteen, or so, when they are either sold or taken home to live out their lives with one of the teamsters. Nauvoo is lucky to have these magnificent animals for all to enjoy.

The Irony of It All...

The Titanic has been in the news lately because of an unfortunate occurrence that caused even more lives to be lost relating to the ship. Journalist Peggy Noonan's June 24, 2023, article in *The Wall Street Journal* tells of an eerie comparison.

The Titanic sank in April 14, 1912. In 1955 the history of The Titanic, A Night to Remember, was published. The epic movie Titanic was released in 1997. However, a book on a similar event was published in 1898, thirteen years BEFORE the ship sank. Morgan Robertson wrote a novel about a fabulous Atlantic Ocean liner carrying wealthy, self-satisfied people that went down after hitting an iceberg one cold April night. The [Titanic] was 66,000 tons displacement; Robertson's [liner] was 7-,000. The real ship was 882.5 feet long; the fictional one, 800." Both vessels could carry ca. 3,000 people, both could make 24 to 25 knots, and both carried only a fraction of the lifeboats needed if something bad happened. But little matter, because both were called "unsinkable." What did Robertson call his ship? "The Titan."

Ameren Rate Adjustment

Ameren Illinois' adjusted electric supply rate for residential customers, posted Tuesday, was set at 7.877 cents per kilowatthour, or 3.72 cents less than the City of Nauvoo's electric aggregation rate of 11.6 cents per kilowatthour.

The utility's new tariff rate, which is the price consumers can use to compare to the City's electric aggregation rate, became effective today (June 1). The City's electric aggregation rate will become effective with electric meter readings in July. Although the municipality's rate was lower than Ameren's supply cost when bids were taken, recent auctions for energy supply produced significantly lower charges for electric generating capacity and fuel, the major components of electric aggregation rates in Illinois.

The City designed its electric aggregation program to assure that participants have access to the lowest price available on the market by permitting them to opt out of electric aggregation at any time and at no cost. Participants can opt out by calling Constellation toll-free or by going online. They should have their ten-digit Ameren account number available to opt out.

To opt out by phone, residents can call Constellation's toll-free number for Nauvoo, 833-603-1329. Calls are taken in the order received, and callers can avoid lengthy wait times by leaving a request for a return call. There is no wait time for those who use Constellation's online opt-out service at www.constellation.com/il-nauvoo and following these steps:

- ⇒Click Opt-Out Online in gray area at bottom of page.
- ⇒Click the blue Find My Code button.
- ⇒Enter your ten-digit Ameren account number and on the next page:
 - Review account information.
 - •Enter email if you'd like an opt out confirmation.
 - •Check the box.
 - •Click the blue button, Do Not Participate.

Nauvoo voters at a referendum authorized the City's electric aggregation initiative. The City paused its program in early 2022 when competitive prices exceeded Ameren's.

Electricity prices have been volatile in the regulated as well as the competitive market over the past year. Ameren's regulated supply rate more than doubled—from 5.478 cents per kilowatthour in May 2022 to 11.833 cents currently. The utility is also permitted to recover and refund differences in its costs of energy when those costs vary by 5 percent from the approved rate. Such cost differences, known as purchased energy adjustments, are passed along on consumers' monthly bills. Electric aggregation customers are not charged purchased energy adjustments.

Ameren will continue to deliver electricity to residents and small businesses, answer calls about power quality and outages, and bill for all electric supply and distribution services.
