The first Nauvoo Oktoberfest in 2022 was a huge hit, attracting over 600 people of all ages and demographics. Because of the first year success, we hope to make it an annual event as has become the Grape Festival/Car Show, Scarecrow Festival, and Pumpkin Walk, Bootiful Nauvoo Celebrations.

Nauvoo has a rich German history and heritage. After the departure of the Mormons and the French Icarians, Nauvoo became the largest German speaking community in Illinois and remailed so until World War One. German was widely spoken in town and in the Catholic, Lutheran, Methodist and Presbyterian churches. During this period, beer and wine making and fruit production thrived in Nauvoo.

Nauvoo German Heritage Day (Oktoberfest) was started by Randy Soland, Knights of Columbus Lector and Nauvoo Historical Society board member, for the purpose to both honor and promote Nauvoo's German history in hopes to bring more local, regional, and far away tourists to town. Quote Brian Riggs (Retired Director of the Fort Madison Area Arts Center) "Nauvoo owns October, with its Scarecrow Festival, Pumpkin Walk, Bootiful Nauvoo and now Oktoberfest.


room. We became friends and stayed in touch until Katie moved to Nashville 7 years ago. We've been together ever since."

#### September City Council September 12, 2023

The aldermen unanimously approved the following:

- To donate \$2,420 to the Hancock County Sheriff Reserve to pay for help policing at the Pageant and Grape Festival events.
- To pay \$3,000 for the engineering portion of an Open Space Lands Acquisition and Development Grant (OSLAD) to apply for a Park Grant. Last month the City Council approved payment of \$1,000 to the Western Illinois Regional Council (WIRC) for this grant application; this \$3,000 was for the engineers. It was pointed out that if the City had not gone through WIRC, the cost for the engineer part would have been \$6,000.
- To contract with Caterpillar for maintenance of the generator at the sewer plant. This six-year agreement will cost the City \$3,968 per year and includes oil changes, battery replacement, and so forth. Last month the City Council approved a similar contract for the generator at the water plant. Alderman Jim Boyles pointed out that these generators "came in really handy after the derecho when we had no power". Even though Nauvooians were without electricity for a few days, they still had water and sewer services.
- "Beggars Night" (what trick-or-treating is called in Nauvoo) hours were set for Monday, October 30, from 5:30-7:30pm. A plea to extend the hours to 8:00pm by a parent in the audience went unheeded. The little goblins will have to move quickly to fill their bags that night.

Some things were set aside for a future meeting—a proposed crosswalk at the intersection of Mulholland and Wells Streets, pending on City Attorney review of the Memorandum of Understanding between the City and the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT). The contractor who will do the crosswalks asked that this be expedited as he wants to get this done before it gets too cold. The City Council will hold a special meeting on September 26 at 7:00pm to consider this.

Nauvoo resident Susy Swing presented a petition with 23 signatures affixed asking the City Council to approve the site plan for a Visitor Center at the location requested by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (across from Saint Joseph's). She made the following points in support of the location:

- It would widen Wells Street in front of Sts Peter & Paul, thus making it safer.
- That location (rather than a location further away) would better benefit handicapped people.
- It would bring/keep people up near the business area of town.
- It would provide better parking for worshipers at Sts Peter & Paul Catholic Church.

She asked those in the audience who supported the Visitor Center at that location to please stand, which about 25 did.

The meeting adjourned at 8:22pm.

#### Nauvoo Fire Protection District (NFPD) Board of Trustees Meeting September 21, 2023

The first order of business was a review of the Annual Financial Report for 6/1/2022 through 5/31/2023. After the trustees signed-off on the report a local notary public, Jessie Rubio, notarized the signatures.

Gallaher also reported the following:

- The NFPD received \$450 for providing on-site EMS services during the Grape Festival, at which they responded to five EMS incidents.
- They will also be providing on-site EMS services at The BIG Baldridge & Bonfire on September 30th at Nauvoo State Park, where an estimated 2,000 fans are expected to attend. They will be paid \$400 for this service.
- The new brush guard on one of the ambulances worked well. The ambulance struck a deer and did not obtain even a scratch. (In 2021, 14,522 motor vehicle crashes involved deer in Illinois. Of these, 13,936 resulted in damage to property or vehicles, while 584 caused personal injuries. Two of the crashes resulted in fatalities. —-source, Illinois Department of Transportation)
- National Fire Prevention Week will be October 8-14. This year's theme is "Cooking Safety Starts with YOU". NFPD will conduct annual fire drills and inspections at Nauvoo-Colusa and Sts Peter & Paul Elementary during fire prevention week.
- NFPD staff members and other local emergency responders were honored at an event in Keokuk, IA on September 11.
- Two NFPD staff members (Dan & Vicki Gallaher) attended the annual National EMS conference in New Orleans.




Our BIGGEST NEWS yet is our new dog park!!! YES!! Nauvoo has a dog park!! It is at the

#### **Big Resources for a Small City**

I know we already did a write up after the derecho, but this one is a little different. We are hoping to highlight the services and precautions we have in place when an event arises. Perhaps with a glimpse behind the scenes, so to speak, of a City gearing up to take control we can give you an idea of just how much we have going for us.

During the derecho this summer we had a front row seat to watch a small city employ big city effort and resources. While there was no way to know how bad the derecho would be, the fact that we had PLANS, PEOPLE, and RESOURCES in place paid off in a very big way. With the storm still raging, our Local ESDA Representative Dan Gallaher and our Nauvoo Water/Sewer/Streets Departments were already putting plans in motion to make sure Nauvoo residents had their best chances in the face of a raging storm. As the wind was dying down and the rain was still pounding, Dan Gallaher and the Nauvoo Fire Department and Ambulance personnel were gearing up to make sure they had access to clear streets and assessing damages such as down powerlines or injuries. Nauvoo City crews were split, with some out making sure streets were cleared, and others making sure the loss of power did not mean a loss of water to our City. Generators kicked in but assistance was still needed, with our own City Clerk going on site to make sure the guys had accurate readings from the plant. With the City Hall generator running we were able to keep phones working and calls were being answered and citizens being assured that help would be on its way. These were the initial and immediate measures being taken.

In the days to come many of the cities around us would expend a considerable amount of time and funds clearing debris after the derecho. Fortunately, Nauvoo was cleaned up and manageable in a week. Thanks to Nauvoo Facilities Management working with the City we were able to find a place to burn literal tons of wood.

Sometimes when disaster strikes you don't realize all the help that goes on behind the scenes. This article would like to take a minute to highlight some of the emergency responses in place in the City of Nauvoo.

**PERSONNEL:** First and foremost we need to highlight the PEOPLE that are behind the scenes putting everything into action. The cumulative knowledge and experience we have with Dan Gallaher (37 yrs), Vicki Gallaher, Kendall Gallaher, and others on fire and EMS along with Barry Cuthbert (43 yrs), and another 20+ each from Joe Tripp and Jerry Hutson, and add in almost 30 years from Carol McGhghy, you have a CORE of people who have a wealth of knowledge and experience in just about every aspect of this City.

**TECHNICAL:** ALL critical locations in town have powerful generators to keep the emergency services that we need up and running smoothly. In fact the City of Nauvoo just signed into a maintenance contract with Altorfer for both water and sewer plant generators. Barry informed us that out of all the generators Altorfer has installed the ones that were on a regular scheduled maintenance agreements were all functional throughout the storms.

**COMMUNICATION:** Nauvoo ESDA Representative, Dan Gallaher, informed me that currently the Fire Department/EMS is installing Starcom communication in their equipment. Starcom is the communication system that the Illinois State Police and the Hancock County Sheriff use. Starcom communication is vital in emergency situations. The ability of a small town, such as Nauvoo, to have access to a vital communication system like Starcom is imperative. Also in place is a cellular system that is specifically for Emergency Response. While my, and your, cellphone may not work there are plans in place that keep the phones of Emergency Responders online and viable when others are not. Dan says they are moving away from repeater systems due to cost and maintenance so they will be installing Starcom in more vehicles in the near future. Fire Chief, Kendall Gallaher, assured me that there are 4 different ways to access communications. Nauvoo Police Department also uses Starcom communication as well as the cellular service for Emergency Responders.

PHYSICAL/MECHANICAL: Additional hands-on hauling and moving as well as major equipment came from Hancock County Highway Department and IPWMAN – Illinois Public Works Mutual Aid Network. Both locations were contacted immediately by City Hall and came in with manpower and machinery!! They provided multiple dump trucks to add to our own as well as a backhoe with a grappler which could grab on to big logs as well as large piles of debris and made quick work of loading. Fire/EMS currently has 4 fire trucks which includes one of ONLY two ladder trucks in the County. There are also now 3 ambulances that are ALL equipped with ALS (Advanced Life Support).

**SAFETY:** Police Chief Ryan Dykstra has a crew of 7 part-time patrolmen that watch over the City of Nauvoo. Fire/EMS has 30 firefighters that are ALL (every single one) cross-trained as Licensed EMS.

**PLANS:** Nauvoo Fire Department/EMS also has a Hazard Mitigation plan in place for Nauvoo covering multiple events as well as mass casualties. This plan has to be approved by FEMA and has just recently been updated.

There will always be events we cannot foresee, that is just a fact of where we live. I am sure we have all heard the jokes about "it isn't snowing yet? well, just give it 5 minutes." welcome to Midwest weather. While we can have any and all "early warning" systems in place not everyone is going to heed the warnings. While we can watch every weather app available sometimes nature just has a surprise in store that we never saw coming. Just because we may not foresee the extent of it does not mean we are not PREPARED for it. The proper precautions are in place and are constantly being upgraded and updated to make sure to keep our town and your families and ours PREPARED for the future.
