"Run Like the Wind!—Be the Storm!"



That is the theme for the 37th annual Grape Stomp 5K Walk/Run to be held at Nauvoo State Park on Saturday, September 2nd. Registration and packet pick up starts at 7:00am, with the race beginning at 8:00am sharp, rain or shine.

Nauvoo resident John McCarty came up with the idea of the "Run Like the Wind! Be the Storm!", which will be printed on the commemorative shirt which each runner will receive. This year's wind and storm theme commemorates the derecho which slammed Nauvoo on June 29th. McCarty recounted that he "was listening to a classic rock station and the Bob Seger song 'Against the Wind' came on. The flying debris just came into play as I was drawing".

Grape Stomp organizer Margaret Schnieder had this to say: "We had 248 registered last year, that is a record. We had the largest missionary participation last year, ever! It was nice to see so many missionaries participate in a community sponsored event. We are looking forward to another great year!"

According to a Nauvoo Grape Festival post on Facebook, there will be a door prize table which will offer prizes to contestants whose bib number matches the prize. Prizes include gift cards to Three Keys, the Fudge Factory, the Press House Winery, and Baxter's Vineyards and Winery as well as miscellaneous boxes of candy and "maybe a couple of other cool things". Cost to enter is \$25 if done online by noon, September 1st—\$30 if done at the event.

Come join in the race or stand on the sidelines and cheer our participants on to the finish line.

Grape Festival 2023 Grand Marshal

The Nauvoo Grape Festival Sunday Parade's 2023 Grand Marshal is Bev Reynolds. Born Beverly Baxter in Burlington, Iowa, her father, Cap Baxter, owned the Baxter Winery along with his two brothers. When he passed away, the winery was turned over to Kelly and Brenda Logan.

Beverly attended Nauvoo Grade and High Schools. Upon graduating she went to college at Western Illinois University, where she

earned a BS in Education. She later obtained a Bachelors in Business Administration from Bradley University, and a Master's Degree in Education from Western.

She met her future husband, Joe Reynolds, in 1957 during her Junior year at Western. "He came to my friend's party and he asked me to the Greek Ball. That was our first date. We married December 22, 1958." Joe was from LaClede and was on Western's basketball team and is in their Hall of Fame. He passed away in November 2018, just short of their 60th anniversary.

Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds taught at Union High School in Biggsville. Bev taught for 30 years until retiring in 1986. Since then, she has substituted at Fort Madison, Keokuk, and Hamilton High Schools.

She currently serves as a board member of the Nauvoo Historical Society. On that note, Bev related to me that way back in 1936 her mother and father traveled to Traverse City, Michigan for the National Cherry Festival. They were favorably impressed and brought back ideas to start a Grape Festival in Nauvoo. The first Nauvoo Grape Festival was held in 1938.

Along with Oscar and Millie Rhode, owners of the cheese factory, they started the annual Wedding of the Wine and Cheese that used to be part of the Grape Festival.

Bev says it is an honor to be chosen as Grand Marshal of the 2023 Nauvoo Grape Festival Parade. It seems she is continuing a family tradition. Her mother, Hilda Baxter was Grand Marshal in 2007. She was 100 years old at the time.

August City Council August 8, 2023

A brief emergency meeting was held [sic] at 7:20pm. The aldermen unanimously approved a resolution to waive bidding requirements and to approve emergency expenditures for road and bridge purposes due to the severe weather and/or excessive rainfall over the August 4-6 weekend, including necessary culvert and bridge repairs. The brief meeting adjourned at 7:23. City Council meeting was brought to [sic] order at 7:30pm.

The Aldermen unanimously approved the following:

- To approve the Acting Mayor to be a 3rd signature on City checking accounts (in case the City Clerk or City Treasurer is unavailable to do so).
- To authorize \$3,680 to purchase a maintenance agreement for the generator at the Water Plant. This purchase includes six years of maintenance, inspection, as well as a one-time coolant service and battery replacement for a generator for the Water Plant.
- To authorize \$2,000 to purchase and install a cage and partition for the Durango police car. (Such a cage/partition costs \$4,500 new, but Nauvoo Police Chief Dykstra found a used one that the Hancock County Sheriff will sell for \$500, a nice savings to the City. It will cost \$1,500 to get it installed.) Funding for the purchase will come from the cannabis tax money the City receives.
- To pay a \$1,000 application fee to apply for a Parks Grant.
- To authorize up to \$2,000 to purchase a new computer for the Nauvoo Police. The current computer is becoming obsolete.
- To approve the construction of four-way stop signs and school zone signs at Wells and Young Streets and near the Sts Peter & Paul Elementary School.
- To approve the first reading of a TIF agreement between the City and the Nauvoo Christian Visitor Center to reimburse for funds spent on new store front.

The City Council upheld the Planning Commission's recommendation to deny a zoning change request by Matt Cobb at 35 Horton Drive to establish a trailer park. Mr. Cobb can submit an updated request in the future.

The City Council then tabled the issue of the new LDS Visitors Center until it receives another attorney opinion as well as the City attorney's opinion.

The City Council then accepted a bid from Laverdiere Construction of Macomb for construction of sidewalks, parking, hardscape, and lighting. The bid was for \$339,964. They aldermen unanimously voted to approve the bid, plus 10% more for contingencies, which brought the total to \$377,738. The Nauvoo Community Center Capital Campaign Committee (NC5) has around \$200,000 in donations and grants, the City will pay for the rest.

Newly minted Eagle Scout Rebecca Moberly of BSA Troop 219 presented the City with a thumb-drive of digitized old City Sexton records, which she led troop members to scan and archive as her Eagle Scout project. Another thumb drive is available at the Weld House Museum, owned and cared for by the Nauvoo Historical Society.

This event sponsored by the Nauvoo Betterment Association (NBA) has been a popular one for our citizens and visitors to Nauvoo. In previous years our residents have shown their creativeness and shared their talent with around 60 scarecrows in all shapes and sizes. Registration is due by noon on October 6 to be eligible for judging with prizes being awarded for Best in Show and Best Natural Crow categories.

Since the NBA is initiating a new project highlighting what is natural in Nauvoo, we have made the new scarecrow category of Natural Crow. This includes crows representing the Mississippi River, eagles, birds, wildlife, aquatic life, trees, plants and all things around us and we would like to encourage crow makers to use what nature has given us when creating their crow.

Also new this year is the People's Choice Award which will be determined through Facebook posting. The "Crow" with the most likes/votes will be claiming the title. Watch Facebook starting October 1 for the entries.

All scarecrow winners will be announced at the 2nd annual Spooktacular Soup Sampling on October 7 at 4:30 PM at Grandpa John's Café, following the all-time classic movie "The Wizard of Oz" sponsored by the Nauvoo Public Library (starting at 2:30). For \$10 a person you will be able to sample a variety of soups made by local chefs, be able to vote for your 3 favorite soups and receive cookies and a bottle of water.

Festival On Wheels



In 1978, Nauvoo-Colusa High School Junior John McCarty was asked if he could put on a car show as another activity to the Grape Festival (which itself began in 1938). Young John accepted the challenge, never imagining that it would grow to what it is today. He also never thought he would still be the chairman of the event 46 years later! That first year

there were 23 entries. Today the Festival on Wheels boasts a gathering of around 500 cars from all over the Midwest; each one hoping to take home a coveted award, perhaps one of the grand prizes or simply just to hear the comments from the thousands of spectators as they admire their vehicle. In 2002, a record 620 cars filled the two empty lots and catapulted the annual event to one of the premiere cars shows in the Midwest. Over the years many new attractions have been added to the Nauvoo car show, the biggest one being the combining of Warsaw's Cruise Night, Hamilton's Classic AutoFest and the Nauvoo car show into one big Labor Day Weekend Annual Rolling Up the River.

The revved-up weekend begins Friday, September 1st in Warsaw. Participants will receive a huge welcome from the Warsaw Lions Club, along with a chance to win some of the \$1,000 prize money.

The vehicles, drivers, car buffs and the just plain curious will pour into Hamilton City Park on Saturday, September 2nd for the 15th Annual Hamilton Classic AutoFest.


Early Sunday morning, September 3rd, the Nauvoo car show volunteers will gather to welcome and help park the remaining entries as they roll into town. There (across from the Nauvoo State Park) will be something for everyone interested in things automotive; from perfectly restored classic cars to full-blown customs, from brand-new to 100-year-old vehicles, from motorcycles to semis, from monster trucks to low-riders: there will be a vehicle for everyone's taste!

On Sunday there will be the "Grape Panel Jam Art Auction". Local automotive artists and pin-stripers along with fellow artists from Tennessee, Chicagoland, Central Iowa, Missouri and even Florida will donate custom hand-painted artwork to be auctioned off to raise money for a scholarship fund that was created to help graduating seniors entering an automotive trade school with expenses. Since its start in 2012, over \$23,000 has been awarded to several young people throughout the area. One of the originators of the Panel Jam, Tom Ciolek, passed away shortly after the auction was started, so the scholarship name was changed to honor his memory. These artists donate all their time and talent to keep this dream and his memory alive.
