Nauvoo's New Tourism Director/Event Coordinator

Grand Opening of Nauvoo City Center

In a ceremony on April 15, the Nauvoo Community Center Capital Campaign Committee (NC5) officially turned the new community building over to the city. The project started with the need for more library space and morphed into the inclusion of city offices and a community gathering place for civic and cultural needs of the community. The project took more than 12 years from inception to completion.

Many concessions were made to the project's design due to money –including the buildings relocation on the lot (funding to raze the old school was prohibitive), and the building was designed and redesigned many times with the hopes of retaining the project's integrity. Some "bugs" have been worked out; others, still need resolution.

NC5's task was to raise funds solely for the building's construction. A state library grant and donations yielded approximately \$2M. Remaining funds after construction and the \$18,000 raised at the opening's fundraiser, allowed NC5 to underwrite the costs of an irrigation system, outdoor signage, a memorial garden area sculpture, and-- if funds permit--some lobby furniture.

The celebratory speakers reflected their appreciation. John McCarty, mayor who formed the NC5 in 2012 and was a member throughout the process, reflected on the project's history. Amber Bevier, librarian, spoke of her gratitude for the added space for materials and programs. Terry Knoche, Food Pantry chairman, noted the Pantry's gratefulness to the Kraus family for 22 years of rent-free space and went on to explain how the new location will help serve the community even better. Eric Black reflected on his father's, Roger Black, guiding role in NC5 the process. Acting-mayor Tacy Nelson was generous with her comments on the meaning of "Center" in Nauvoo's new community hub.

The elephant has the longest gestation period—22 months, almost two years. The project lasted over 10, the labor that went into its birthing was not without complications. Even the naming had its moments. However, the delivery was successful, and the future looks bright. Thank you to all who contributed to bring the Nauvoo City Center into the world.



The Nauvoo City Council Tuesday, April 9 2024

The Nauvoo City Council met at the City Center Tuesday evening, April 9. Acting Mayor Tacy Nelson started the meeting at 7:31pm.

The Nauvoo City Aldermen voted unanimously to:

- Hire the "Every Nook and Cranny" cleaning company to clean the City Center every two weeks at \$40/hour for a couple of months. (The City will look for alternatives, including purchasing an upright vacuum for cleaning up after events.)
- Purchase of an i-Phone 13 for the City Police Department. The phone is free with a contract with Verizon. The contract costs the same as a landline, but the iPhone has more uses and purposes, and includes a "Hot Spot".
- Purchase Body Cameras for Nauvoo police officers. Police body-worn cameras are required by Illinois law and must be in place by January 1, 2025. The cost is \$37,000, but Nauvoo can be reimbursed from a special state fund set up to help small municipalities pay for it.
- Hire "Plate Lawn Care" to mow City properties at \$670 per mowing.
- Approve the building permit for the Nauvoo Temple Visitor Center.

The Nauvoo Public Library has had high visitor numbers. As many patrons visited the library during March as usually visit during the historically busier summer months. The new and larger library seems to be a hit with the public.

Janet Hill from the City's Economic Development Committee suggested forming a task force to document the status of Nauvoo's facilities, such as the sewer system, so that we are ready to apply for grants when the opportunity arises.

Rebecca Williamson, the Tourism Director, is searching for a spot to install a self-service kiosk for kayak rentals. Here's how it would work:

The kiosk will have lockers holding kayaks, paddle boards, and life-jackets. Customers will need to agree to liability waivers on a touch screen, choose their kayak and rental hours, and pay with a credit card. Once paid, the locker containing the chosen equipment will unlock, allowing the customer to take it. To return the gear, the customer swipes the same card, and the machine opens their locker for them to put everything back. If the locker isn't closed properly, the machine will alert them and potentially charge extra for late returns.

While an out-of-town company handles kayak maintenance and liability, they need a local person in charge. Suggestions for locations include Parley Street, the boat dock, or Nauvoo State Park, although there might be some "red tape" challenges at the park. According to Williamson, Similar kiosks have been successful in other places like Quincy and Mount Sterling have such kiosks, with self-serve kayak rentals being popular across the country.

Nauvoo resident Annie Parkinson reported 11 stray cats living on her property, only two of which are spayed/neutered and that it costs \$150 to spay or neuter a cat. Since these cats don't belong to her, she asked if there was a program available to help with the issue. She was told to contact a local group in town to see if they could help, as there are no resources in Hancock County since the Animal Control facility was closed.


Renewal Reminder!

MAY marks the beginning of the fiscal year for the City of Nauvoo – that means it is time to **REMEMBER** to **REGISTER**, and **RENEW!!**

- REGISTER: If you have a DOG within the Nauvoo city limits, it MUST be registered with City Hall and have a DOG TAG. *BE WARNED: We will have stronger enforcement of this ordinance going forward*
- REGISTER: If you have a new or different ATV within Nauvoo City limits, it MUST be registered with City Hall and display a STICKER in the CENTER OF THE ORANGE SAFTEY TRIANGLE ON THE BACK OF THE VEHICLE. *BE WARNED: We will have stronger enforcement of improper highway and road usage going forward*
- **REGISTER:** If you have a business with the Nauvoo City limits, your business **MUST** be registered with City Hall and you **MUST** have a City Business License.
- REGISTER: If you operate AIR B&B OR NIGHTLY RENTAL within Nauvoo City limits, your rental MUST be registered with City Hall and you MUST have a Hotel/Motel Business License. PLEASE RESPECT THOSE OWNERS OPERATING THEIR BUSINESS PROPERLY AND DO NOT TRY TO FIND A LOOP HOLE!! You may thing you are pretty smart and you are reaping the profits but you are hurting not only your friends and neighbors that are doing this the proper way but you are hurting the town of Nauvoo itself.

NFPD Hosts and Eggcelent Fundraiser

The Nauvoo Fire Protection District (NFPD) hosted a fundraising breakfast at the Nauvoo Fire Station Saturday (30 March). NFPD EMTs and Firefighters served up the delicious morning meal which featured pancakes cooked on a large round griddle, scrambled eggs, link sausages, and a choice of beverages (coffee, milk, orange juice, and water). Cost of the breakfast was a freewill offering deposited into a firefighter boot watched over by two NFPD Trustees. About 285 people showed up for breakfast. Nearly \$2,200 was raised, which will be used to purchase new Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs).

As it got closer to 10:00, more families came. After breakfast was over, everyone assembled outside for the children's easter egg hunt. Colorful plastic eggs filled with candy had been scattered throughout the field west of the fire station. The children lined up to gather the eggs and upon the signal from Vicki Gallaher on the bullhorn, the youngsters moved out to harvest the crop. A generous harvest it was, too. One little girl gathered as much candy in five minutes as a twelve-year-old trick-or-treater would haul in after an hour's work!

The field was enthusiastically picked clean in minutes. The plastic eggshells were returned to large plastic bins to be used next year. NFPD Fire Chief Kendall Gallaher summed up the morning with these words: "Our Fire District is very grateful for the wonderful turnout and community support. We have been doing this event for about 33 years now and it has become a tradition for many families in the community. We love seeing the members of the community. This event also provides a boost in funding for our fire district which enables the district to purchase crucial equipment like AEDs. We appreciate everyone's support."



The Nauvoo Community Choir presented a Spring Concert at the Nauvoo Discovery Center (1110 Ripley St.) The concert featured 11 songs. The evening began with a rendition of Scarborough Fair, followed by soprano soloist Katherine Hull singing O Savior Hear Me. As the night continued, the audience enjoyed spiritual tunes like Simple Gifts (an old Shaker song), Greensleeves (sung by bass soloist Jacob Clayton), Amazing Grace (bass Lee Shuck), The Prayer (a duet by Joanne Gallaher and Rick Marshall), and How Great Thou Art (a duet by Katherine Hull and Lee Shuck). The 25-member choir didn't shy away from more lively tunes, and its enthusiasm shone through Buffalo Gals, the fun 1940s tune Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy sung by the Andrews Sisters. Admission was a freewill donation.

The venue, formerly Christ Lutheran Church, was beautiful. The wooden floors and the stained-glass windows, including the one of Christ the Shepherd, added to the ambiance. While listening I thought at times of the generations of Christians who had worshipped within these walls since the 19th century. It is truly one of Nauvoo's treasures.

What's All the Buzz About? The Cicadas Are Coming!

An alert from a University of Illinois entomologist (one who studies insects) indicates that this year from mid May to mid June we will be besieged by two of the 15 broods of cicadas known to exist in the United States: the Northern Illinois and the Great Southern broods. Once every 200 years or so these 13 and 17-year cicadas hatch out of the ground simultaneously, causing an overabundance of food all at one for birds, lizards, etc. Billions, yes billions, will be in the air and in the trees and dropping on the ground.

It almost make one wonder if Rolaids or Tums should be put out for the birds, lizards, etc., who are going to have a giant amount of food all at once!)

Cicadas aren't necessarily beneficial, nor are they particularly harmful; however, they will do damage to young trees. Once they emerge and mate, they lay eggs in small trees, which may damage or even kill the tender trees. Trees that were planted last year should have large mesh bags placed over them that are tied off at the bottom. Instead of planting a tree this spring, you might want to wait until the fall.

Nature Corner

Any Bats in Your Belfry?



To be called "batty" originally meant "flying around" erratically like a bat, or being crazy in the head. Bats, however, definitely are NOT erratic nor crazy. Bats (order Chiroptera) are the world's only flying mammal with true

and sustained flight. They have numerous good qualities among them providing the vital ecosystem services by reducing insect density. This helps protect young trees from having their foliage eaten, causing them to die. Bats' major prey items include moths, beetles, flies, and "true bugs." * (See article below.)

According to a University of Illinois Extension pamphlet, Illinois has thirteen species, three of which are federally endangered; six are State listed. Most bats in Illinois spend their days roosting in trees from late March to late October. Trees may host tens to hundreds of females in a "maternity colony." Along the River Road between Nauvoo and Hamilton, tree trimming work done by the State stops the end of March so as not to disturb the returning bats who are faithful to their summer roosting area, returning to the same tree(s) or forest patch each year.)

Don't Bug, or Me.

Just what is the difference between a bug and a "true bug"? Did you know that not all insects are "bugs"? There are bugs and there are true bugs. The key difference is that true bugs have specialized mouth parts that are modified into an elongated sucking beak used to suck juices—mostly fluids from plants: leaf hoppers, aphids, cicadas, stink bugs, water bugs.... But there are some true bugs, like bed bugs, that feed on animals. True bugs—in the taxonomy of insects-belong to the order of insects called Hemiptera. They have soft flat bodies, well-developed antennae, and stink glands. The 17- and 13-yeaar broods of cicadas (true bugs) will emerge simultaneously across the Midwest this year, providing food for bats as well as swallows, grackles, wrens, among others. Gorge time!

Tree Tents

Tent caterpillars build their large, silken "tents" spanning several limbs. They emerge in early May and create these white structures for protection from the elements and predators when they are not devouring the host trees' leaves. Tent caterpillars are tasty tidbits for bluejays, blackbirds, and robins, to name a few.
